Course Details

NCEA Level 3 Art History is an informative and intellectually rewarding course as the study of art contributes to an understanding of past and present cultures. The course will enable you to interpret the meaning of specific paintings, recognise stylistic conventions and understand the function of art within the social context of its time. The course focuses on mid-to-late fifteenth-century Italy. The works of Giovanni Bellini, Mantegna, Botticelli and Leonardo da Vinci, are studied to provide background to the development of the High Renaissance and Mannerism. All aspects of Michelangelo's work, sculpture, painting and architecture, are studied. Mannerism is studied in the work of Pontormo, and the late works of Raphael and Michelangelo. Titian provides the Venetian counterpart to the High Renaissance and Mannerist styles.
